Bob filled in for Ed Moritz who unfortunately at the last second was unable to attend the conference this year due to personal reasons. Our thoughts and prayers are with you and your family.

Ed had planned to give a talk about his experience in Federal Land Swaps likely sourcing his recent experience with the SITLA transaction that included around 45,000 acres of land and mineral property to be swapped between a state entity and a federal entity. The title of the talk was **Valuing Mineral Interests in Federal Land Exchanges.**

As Bob Frahme did not work on this assignment with Ed Moritz, he decided to discuss another land and mineral swap he was the chief appraiser on in Alaska, with a supporting example from an eminent domain case in Pennsylvania. The title of Bob's paper was "Land and Minerals Exchanges: The Rules and Appraisal Reality". Bob's point was that the rules and regulations cannot always anticipate all appraisal situations and that in the end, the appraiser's responsibility is to reflect market actions, not slavishly follow rules and regulations that are sometimes drawn from poorly related appraisal situations. He indicated that it can be an arduous path. Ed's talk was aimed at the same point, using his SITLA example, so both papers went to the same conclusion.

It was a great talk and in addition to excellent content we all enjoyed the anecdotes and great photographs. My favorite story was when the plane literally landed on fumes and did not have enough fuel to get off the runway at Prudhoe Bay. MEMBER VOTE RE-NAME CHANGE

[A letter was recently sent out and the newsletter reinforces the importance of this letter by reprinting it. If you as a member did not receive the letter or ballot to vote please contact the current president, John Manes, Tim Knobloch or other board members immediately.]

23 March 2014

To All Certified Minerals Appraisers,

The attached Ballot contains two items requiring your vote FOR or AGAINST. One is very important for the future of our Institute, while the other is a matter of housekeeping. The name change to "International Institute of Minerals Appraisers" has been discussed at two Annual Meetings and both times received an informal, unanimous vote FOR by the voting members at those venues. Now, under the AIMA By-Laws (Article 10, Amendments) the Executive Committee calls for your formal vote on the attached Ballot. Approval FOR is needed by a simple majority of the voting membership.

The reasons to vote FOR the name change are manifold. Several are listed here:

- Our cross-disciplinary profession of valuation of the mineral real estate asset, which underlies all extractive industries, is truly applied internationally. This is a fact, whether we rely on Brent oil prices or metal price forecasts for our DCF approaches. Likewise, our Subject Properties are frequently located in different countries and so may be the Comparable Sales from which we adjust.
- 2. Our membership has followed trend and we now have members in a number of countries, who would like to be heard within their own jurisdiction as members of their respective Chapter of our International Institute. Volunteers have already stepped forward to form the Canadian Institute of Minerals Appraisers and the Hong Kong Institute of Minerals Appraisers, both to become geographical chapters of the International Institute of Minerals Appraisers. We have also had a preliminary discussion with our Australian member regarding a chapter in that region.
- 3. The American Institute of Minerals Appraisers will continue, and all members will automatically remain members of the American chapter of the International Institute of Minerals Appraisers until when and if they form their own chapter. Our members will be able to continue with their present seal and sign off on Appraisals as usual, because of our non-profit business status. Chapter seals may be obtained showing primarily the geographical chapter, and also the IIMA relationship.
- 4. We have worked hard since 1991 and have represented our profession to industry and in courts, as well as to numerous other professions (other appraisers, attorneys, accountants) among whom in particular the latter continue to impart their parochial desires on our mineral standards. They are international, so we need to function more like the international valuation professionals, whom the AIMA represents.
- 5. Finally, if we at the AIMA do not step up internationally, somebody else will, so now is the time.

The other subject is a ratification of a procedure under which the AIMA has satisfactorily worked since 2001, but which requires ratification by the voting membership. The "AIMA Ethics Complaints Procedures" dated 15 March 2001 under Section 5.2 Administrative Steps might in certain cases lead to implementation of the discipline imposed against a Member, including temporary or permanent termination. Therefore, the Procedures, which are strictly followed to protect both the Public and the Member, must be approved by the voting membership.

Your attention is requested to the attached ballot, which may be mailed in the addressed, stamped envelope. International members may affix their own stamps and mail the Ballot, or fax the Ballot to AIMA Headquarters (1-303-443-3156), or scan and Email the Ballot directly to the AIMA Secretary, Tim Knobloch, tknobloch@jkpcinc.com who will count all Ballots. You are urged to vote immediately, but in no case will Ballots be counted, if received after 30 April 2014.

The AIMA currently consists of 31 CMA members, 5 Members Emeritus, 16 Associate members, and 3 Affiliates. To continue to be effective in advancing the profession of appraisal of minerals; establishing qualifications for minerals appraisers; certifying the qualifications of individual Member appraisers to the public; and promoting high standards of ethical conduct among its Members, and within the profession of appraisal of minerals the institute needs to continue to grow.

One way to achieve growth is to actively seek to move Associate Members to Members and to recruit new Associate Members. Since the Institute is required by the bylaws to establish standards of education, experience, and professional conduct to protect the public from unprofessional practices; monitors governmental and other activities affecting the appraisal of minerals; and communicates with the public, it is incumbent upon the Members to help provide the education and guidance needed by Associate Members to become Members. In the past this has been done through the Institute's mentoring program, which is still active but in need of reinvigoration. Currently the Institute has 6 Members acting as Mentors with 9 Associates, but 7 Associate Members are without a Mentor.

If the Institute is to thrive in the future and continue to establish qualifications for minerals appraisers and be an influence domestically and internationally in the field of minerals valuation, we need more Members to work as Mentors in the mentoring program. Yes, mentoring takes time and effort on the part of the Members, but remember the advantages, we receive from the Institute.

Therefore, please volunteer to become a Mentor. It is very satisfying to work with younger and/or less experienced minds. Also, we now have a Guide1 for you to work from and a detailed profile2 of each Associate. In addition, the Institute will through 2014 let you claim Continuing Education Credits at the rate of 1 CE hour for every 2 hours you spend in person, on the phone or by Email mentoring the Associate.

MINUTES AIMA ANNUAL MEETING 55 WEST 100 SOUTH, SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH

Commence: 25 FEB 2014, 12:00 PM

- 1. WELCOME: Fred Pirkle, AIMA President welcomed all attendees and assumed the Chair of the Meeting.
- 2. SECRETARY OF MEETING: John Manes accepted the task of keeping Minutes of the Meeting.
- 3. SME 2014: Fred Pirkle applauded and complimented Richard Jolk and Tim Knobloch for coordinating and chairing this year's SME Valuation presentations.
- 4. ATTENDANCE: A Sign-In Sheet was circulated.

- 5. QUORUM: A call for voting of CMA members and proxies was performed by Fred Pirkle. Present at the meeting initially were seven members, including three officers of the AIMA, and three Associates. Present were the following people:

A Quorum was thus established by 16 voting Certified Minerals Appraisers including 3 Officers.

Four Members arrived later during the meeting:

- 6. AGENDA: A copy of the 2014 agenda was distributed. John Gustavson motioned to approve the 2014 agenda, John Manes seconded. All members voted in favor of.
- 7. 2013 MINUTES: Fred Pirkle asked to approve the Minutes from the 2013 Annual Meeting, as published in the April 2013 AIMA Newsletter. John Manes motioned to approve the 2013 minutes and Louis Posgate seconded the motion. All members voted in favor of.
- 8. GUESTS AND NEW MEMBERS: Fred Pirkle introduced a new Certified Minerals Appraiser (Chris Wyatt of Behre Dolbear) and a new Associate Member (Dan Cordier of Molycorp), who were both present at the meeting. There were no guests.
- 9. TREASURER'S REPORT: Bill Bagby presented the Treasurer's Report, in behalf of Charles Howard.

The account balance on January 1, 2013 was \$5,093.50. Expenses for Bank Charges, Luncheon Meeting, Reimbursements, Website hosting and Repairs totaled \$2,620.85 for 2013. Income from Dues, Luncheon Fees, DVD Sales, Application Fees and Reimbursements was \$5,993.00, leaving a 2013 year end balance of \$8,405.70.

The 2014 Budget anticipates dues of \$5,605.00, funds from the luncheon, DVD sales, and new members of \$2,330.00 for a

total estimated income of \$7,935.00. Expenses for website, hosting, luncheon, DVD recording expenses, bank fees, newsletter and E&O insurance are anticipated to be \$7,552.10.

John Gustavson explained that the Treasurer's Report contains a liability of \$2,252.70 for the 2013 DVD Recording, which had never been billed. However, the delivery was badly mixed up, so possibly the contractor, Freeman decided not to bill. The item should be kept as a Contingent Liability in the 2014 Budget.

A brief break was taken to order lunch.

Fred Pirkle thanked the following for contributions made to the very successful Social Event at AIMA's co-shared suite the prior evening:

- Chris Wyatt of Behre Dolbear & Company, Inc. contributed \$300 to the AIMA Social
- John Manes of Mineral Valuation Specialists contributed \$200 to the AIMA Social

The 2014 Budget was presented as being barely balancing and certainly justifying the 2014 increase in dues. After minor changes, the 2014 Budget was firmed up.

John Gustavson motioned to approve the Treasurer's Report and the 2014 Budget. Trevor Ellis seconded the motion, and all voted in favor.

 EDITOR: Matt Chapman announced he is always seeking contributions from authors toward the Newsletter. His Goal is to publish 3 to 4 AIMA Newsletters per year. Seeking volunteers to provide articles – anything helps. Fred Pirkle mentioned that lessons learned from jobs would be good topics and also that Associates can help out. Lou Posgate recommended that standards/issues that impact valuation could be listed in the newsletter. Trevor Ellis asked where to find Newsletters and John Manes commented that they are on the AIMA Website, per the "Newsletter" tab on the side pane. A Member commented that the archive only went through April 2013. John Manes promised to update.

11. COMMITTEE REPORTS

- a. Certification Committee (Chair: John Manes) John Manes mentioned that 2 members were certified in 2013-2014
- b. Continuing Education Committee (Chair: John Gustavson) John Gustavson mentioned that his Committee had provided course information to various classes of members, including some courses, which offered 20% discount to the AIMA. In addition, the AIMA had offered a rebate to Associates in some cases. A listing of approved courses is still missing, so each Member, who seeks CE Credits, still uses his own judgment and/or contacts the Chair. Compliance with the AIMA CE requirements can be tracked bv Members on the "Members Only" part of the web site. The AIMA does not outright police the compliance by its Members. However, it is an Ethics Code violation to be in default and still present a Certified Minerals oneself as Appraiser. The 2014 Dues Statement contains language, whereby a Certified Minerals Appraiser confirms that he/she is in compliance with the CE requirements. The current requirement is 10 CE credits per year on three-year rolling centers (calculated as Contact Hours with 100% appraisal content in contrast to technical, legal, economic, accounting or similar supporting content).

- c. Ethics Committee (Chair: John Gustavson) reported that no Ethics Complaints had been received. However, a few members asked assistance where they had been accused of Ethics violations. If members allegedly break the Ethics Code, the AIMA now has the mechanism to offer AIMA CMA's independent Appraisal Review under USPAP, at the cost of the member.
- d. Membership Committee (Chair: Fred Pirkle) 4 associates were accepted in 2013-2014, and 1 new associate was currently applying.
- e. Mentoring Committee (Chair: John Gustavson) stated that the AIMA has 16 Associates, but only half has been assigned Mentors. He recommended attendance the following day at the announced Mentor/Mentee Meeting. A Mentoring handbook is being prepared with input from former and present mentors. Input is being solicited. Bob Frahme added that the most satisfying and rewarding thing you can do is be a mentor. John Gustavson added that a Mentor can justifiably claim 1 hour mentoring CE on his/her Continuing Education record for every 2 hours of intense mentoring.
- f. Newsletter Committee (Chair: Matt Chapman): Previously discussed during EDITOR's comments.
- g. Nomination Committee (Chair: Don Warnken): Don Warnken announced the results of the election of AIMA Officers for 2014/2015: John Manes (President), John Gustavson (Vice President), Charles Howard (Treasurer), and Tim Knobloch (Secretary). Fred Pirkle will serve as Past President. Instead of handing the Meeting over to the new President, John Manes and in order to maintain recording continuity purposes, John Gustavson motioned that John

Manes should remain Secretary of the Annual Meeting and that Past President Fred Pirkle should continue to chair the Annual Meeting. This was approved by acclamation.

- h. Standards Harmonization Committee (Chair: Trevor Ellis) Trevor Ellis reported that three members belong to IMVAL and 4 regular AIMA Members belong to the SME Standards Group. Currently working on Template/Full set of International Valuations. A first round Draft was sent out a few months ago, prepared by South Africa. This was modified by the SME Standards committee through extensive rewrites performed earlier this year. All revisions went to IMVAL and are being discussed at the SME standards meeting tomorrow.
- i. Website Committee (Chair: John Manes); John Manes reported that changes to the website are tricky files scattered and changes could disable website. Also commented that we don't control/know the server/IP, etc therefore if it ever fails, the website is out. Planning on limited revisions (due to budget constraints) including the following:
 - New sidebar organization
 - Split membership classes to 4 separate pages
 - Links color coded
 - Links to download applications/membership page
 - DVD sales listed
 - Reformat newsletter layout
 - Papers

Trevor Ellis offered to donate \$1,000.00 to the cost of website updates. Louis Posgate also offered to donate \$200.00 to the cost of website updates.

j. New Committee Chair Volunteers for 2014. The following volunteered to

The 2014/2015 President thanked the volunteers and will consider these volunteers and/or make his own appointments.

- 12. OLD BUSINESS: Fred Pirkle continued discussion with old business.
 - a. Applicant Name Screening. A proposal had been made at the 2013 Annual Meeting that Applicants' names should be circulated for by comments the general membership prior to acceptance. A discussion followed. It was the consensus that the confidential 3man peer review Certification Committee had all the information and capability to perform without further delays from membership possible comments and blackballing. A motion to table this issue was made by John Gustavson, seconded by Bill Bagby, and voted with all in favor.
 - b. Approval of Ethics Complaint Procedure. John Gustavson reported that the AIMA Ethics Complaints Procedures, dated 15 March 2001 always have been followed, but that

these Procedures need approval by a majority of the voting membership under the bylaws, Article 10, Amendments. The Procedure needs a simple ratification by 50% of the voting members. A ballot will be sent out to the voting members for ratification of the AIMA Ethics Complaints Procedures.

c. Name change to IIMA/changes to bylaws. John Gustavson reported that the work approved by straw vote at the 2013 Annual Meeting has been completed for final vote by the Membership under By Laws Paragraph 10. Amendments. Everything will remain as is, except for the name change under which members may still call themselves members of the AIMA (now to be a Chapter of the IIMA) or, if they so choose to be members of geographically linked locations (Canada, Hong Kong, others). The IIMA will still be the only Institute in the world, which specifically certifies, educates and represents the cross-disciplinary profession of valuation of mineral real estate. A brief mention was made of the Australian Institute of Minerals Appraisers and Valuers, a broader group, which under its definition of "Appraiser" means a Technical Evaluator. This person is competent to assess reserves and resources for mineral inventory, i.e. a person who in the rest of the world is named an engineer or geologist (or other competent person). Communication has been established with this group, at least to avoid misunderstanding of the purposes of the AIMA and its new parent. Lou Posgate made a motion to continue with the ballot issuance and vote. Don Warnken seconded. All voted in favor. John Manes instructed John Gustavson to be very clear in the cover letter with regard to the purpose and favorability of the name change.

- 13. NEW BUSINESS: Fred Pirkle discussed New Business matters.

 - d. VENUE 2015: The SME 2015 Conference and AIMA Annual Meeting will be held in Denver. Chris Wyatt to serve as one Co-Chair, and Tim Knobloch was suggested by John Gustavson as the other, since Tim had contributed greatly to this year's success, but was unable to attend.

CERTIFICATION PROCEDURES

The AIMA Board has established a three-person certification review committee to decide for and against applicants for certification. The committee will meet once each quarter to review completed applications. A unanimous decision will be required to certify or not certify an individual by the threemember committee. Applications receiving a split decision will automatically be forwarded to the Executive Committee of AIMA for its review. In this case, a two-thirds majority of the Executive Committee will be required to obtain certification.

No individual will be certified without submitting to the full application and review procedure. Individuals denied certification may petition for a personal hearing before the review committee that denied his or her original application.

The application fee is \$130, which will cover application and membership fees through the current calendar year, and which should be submitted by check or money order with the completed application form.

It is noted that some Associate Members have not moved to Certified Member status due to a misunderstanding of the requirements. At the Annual AIMA Business meeting held February 25, 2009, in Denver Colorado, the educational requirements to become a certified Minerals Appraiser were changed in the Bylaws to read in part: 2.3.J Education. Educational requirements for membership shall include:

1. a baccalaureate or higher degree in geology, mining or petroleum engineering;

Persons who were Associate Members prior to this membership requirement change can apply for Certification even if they do not hold a degree in geology, mining, or petroleum engineering. The [Chairman of Certification, Fred Pirkle has expressed] that he encourages any Associate Member that became such prior to February 25, 2009, to apply for Certification.

Mentoring of Associate Members by a Certified Member is not a requirement for the Associate Member to become a Certified Member, but it is an offer by the Institute to make the move from Associate to Certified easier.

The institute is looking for more mentors and also is pushing mentorees to work to advance themselves to certification. The Mentoring committee plans to review mentorships on a two year cycle.

While nothing worth doing is done easy, we encourage every associate to work hard, work smart, and reach the goal of Certified Mineral Appraiser. The Mentoring Chair, Fred Pirkle, will do what he can to provide any available resources and to guide you and along this path.
